All of the sword hangers, tennis balls, crowns, banners, and maps seen in the play are based upon Elizabethan designs and hand-made. #### About The Costumes...

Almost all of the clothes that you see on stage this evening have been designed and hand-made by members of The Baron's Men. The costumes range in style from the 1590's through the 1620's. The design of the ladies' gowns for *Henry V* are in the style of the French farthingale, which has a tilted table-top appearance, as opposed to the typically seen Spanish (coned shaped) farthingale. Our Baron's Men costume designers have over 40 years of historical reenactment experience that they put to use to design the costumes for a particular show. The research usually begins in their extensive libraries of costuming books, specifically those by Janet Arnold, as well as large collections of Elizabethan portraits. *Henry V* was a challenge for The Baron's men due to the large number of male cast members needed for the show. Over 12 new doublets (jackets) were designed and manufactured for this production, as well as several different designs of pants (trunk hose, venetians, and pumpkin hose). These clothes could not have been made without the dedication and love of the troupe members who donated many hours and some very late nights to complete the costuming for *Henry V*. We thank them.

#### About The Music...

**Belle Qui Tiens Ma Vie - "Fair One, Who Holds My Heart"** This pavan was first published in Arbeau's Orchesographie in 1588. Such dances are to be "charming and dignified, and well suited to honorable persons."

*Non Nobis Domine* – "*Not to us Oh Lord*" This is a cantus of a canon attributed to William Byrd published in 1589, but is probably borrowed by him in an earlier motet by Philip van Wilder, a musician who worked at the English Court from c. 1520 until 1554.

*Callino Castrame* A broadside ballad registered in 1582. Shakespeare often quoted popular music of the day in his plays and this is one of them.
